A self-guided birdwatching experience at Cape St Albans is not only great for twitchers but a fascinating way for everyone to slow down, relax and enjoy the natural beauty of this unique property at their own pace. TIP

Wear comfortable and sturdy shoes, and dress appropriately for the weather. Take water, your favourite KI produce, your camera or phone, the pocket telescope and torch we provide as part of your CABN X experience and set up at one of the birdlife vantage areas marked on the map.



Unique bird species that can be found at Cape St Albans include a breeding pair of the endangered, White-bellied Sea-Eagles, that have successfully bred a juvenile - you may be lucky enough to spot the pair and offspring, all together. White-bellied Sea- Eagles are admired for their strength, grace, and beauty and known to build large, sturdy nests in tall trees or shrubs near the water. South Australia only has a small, isolated population of 70-80 pairs, and this one pair has made Cape St Albans their home.

The nest is located along the headland, not far from Cape St Albans Lighthouse and can only be seen from water. White-bellied Sea-Eagles have several guard roosts in the vicinity of their nesting territory where they spend considerable amounts of the day, however their feeding area is out to the sea. The pair can be seen flying around the headland and have been observed perched on the Cape St Albans Lighthouse for hours, which gives them visibility along both coast lines, Kona Beach and Antechamber Bay as well as Cape Willoughby.
